ATTENDANCE FOR AUTUMN 2 TERM

At Eltham Church of England Primary School we continue to promote and celebrate good attendance and punctuality. Not only is good attendance beneficial to pupils' achievements it is also an excellent 'life skill'.

We use the Royal Borough of Greenwich's Attendance Advisory Service to monitor and support our management of pupil attendance.

Under Fast Track, families will be informed when their child's attendance has crossed the threshold, even when all absences have been correctly documented and understood. If a child's attendance continues to decline and gives the Attendance Advisory Officer a cause for concern, then a meeting between the school, the parents and the advisory service is convened.

The school's target is to ensure that whole school attendance is consistently above 97% and better still above 97.5%

Can we remind parents that all absences and appointments need to be supported with a written letter, or appointment card, outlining the reason for the absence as soon as your child returns to school.

Also, that **all** holiday will be recorded as unauthorised, however a child's overall attendance will be taken into account when consideration is given to the Fast Track procedures.

WHAT'S NEW FROM FRENCH







FRENCH

I have been so impressed with the enthusiasm shown by children in their language learning this term. We have tackled some pretty challenging concepts in many classes, but the children have tackled each one with determination and resilience. Year 6 children, for example, grappled with how to form negative phrases (you need to place "ne" before the verb and "pas" after the verb).

Such challenges enabled the Year 6 children to have the confidence to travel to Arras, Northern France, on 5th December. We left school extremely early, travelling by coach and Eurotunnel, to arrive at our first destination by mid-morning. The Wellington Quarry is an underground museum of tunnels used to gain an advantage for the Allied troops in the First World War. The children learnt about life for the soldiers in the tunnels and were able to share their own learning with the French guides. Our second stop was the Canadian National Vimy Memorial where children learnt about other countries' actions in the War and how the country remembers their citizens who lost their lives. Our third and final stop was the Christmas Market in Arras. The crêpe stall was the most popular, although there were many other crafts, gifts and food stalls available too. The children impressed the stallholders with their manners and their ability to ask for things in French - well done Year 6. We arrived home in the evening tired, but with many wonderful memories to cherish for years to come.

THIS IS ME and FESTIVALS

What a great start the children in Hope class have made on their school journey. I can't believe it is only 3 and a half months ago they tentatively walked through Nursery's door, now they are so confident and settled.

In our first half term, our topic was 'This is Me'. As part of our studies, we brought in pictures of our families and shared them with our friends, we painted self-portraits, and learnt all about our senses. We read 'Owl Babies' by Martin Waddell, and learnt that families come in different shapes and sizes. In our second half term, our topic was 'Festivals'. We started November by learning about Bonfire night and how to stay safe around fireworks. We also learnt about the festival of Diwali, the Hindu festival of light, and made divas out of clay. On the 11th November, our thoughts turned to Remembrance Day and we prayed for all those affected by war. We made a beautiful window collage out of tissue paper and sticky-back plastic. Please make sure you have a look at it when you pick up your children. Since the start of December, we have been busy preparing for Christmas. We have transformed our role play area into Santa's Workshop, complete with a sleigh. We have enjoyed filling Santa's sack with presents and then placing them under the tree. Last week, we thoroughly enjoyed performing our Nativity story to you all. We have also been busy in different areas of the curriculum. In maths, we learnt about patterns and painted stripy bunting. We also practised counting to 5 and beyond, and learnt how to use a number line. In our outdoor area we have had fun developing different types of movements using the scooters, tricycles and climbing equipment. We have traversed different obstacle courses and developed our sense of balance.

YEAR 1



WHAT'S NEW FROM YEAR 4





YEAR 4

We wanted to take a moment to reflect on the wonderful learning and growth the children have experienced. It has been a pleasure to watch them settle into their new roles as members of the upstairs classrooms, and they have impressed us with their maturity and enthusiasm.

This term, we've been exploring the Anglo-Saxons, and the children have shown great interest in learning about the Heptarchy, the seven kingdoms that made up Anglo-Saxon England. They were particularly fascinated by the Sutton Hoo burial site and the incredible artefacts discovered there, including jewels and pottery from as far as India. This has provided them with a deeper understanding of the wealth and culture of the time.

In Science, we have been studying States of Matter. The children have enjoyed conducting experiments, such as exploring the relationship between mass and volume using a block of cheese and a metal nut. We also tested the melting point of butter using thermometers, which was a hands-on way for the children to apply their scientific knowledge.

In PE, we have been developing our tennis skills. We have focused on mastering the four key shots: fore-hand, backhand, serve, and volley. The children have worked hard on their accuracy and control, and it has been wonderful to see their improvement as they continue to practice their technique.

Next term, we will be focusing on multiplication and division in Maths, studying animals including humans in Science, and exploring textiles and printmaking in Art. In Geography, we will be learning about the water cycle, and we look forward to diving into these exciting topics.

WHAT'S NEW FROM YEAR 5









YEAR 5

Year 5 have had a busy Autumn Term and did amazingly well in their assessments and we are extremely proud of the progress they are making. In Art, have focussed on drawing and painting in the style of Friedensreich Hundertwasser and printmaking, specifically reduction printing. We have been developing our skills in annotating our art work and studying artists including Andy Warhol. We are fascinated with the Ancient Greeks and have thoroughly enjoyed our research in this area. It is clear to see the enthusiasm across the year group for this subject. The children also enjoyed the Ancient Greek Workshop and dressing up for our Greek Day! During our DT Cooking unit, we made a delicious vegetable pasta. All the children enjoyed taking part in the sessions and there are definitely some budding young chefs in Year 5! In Music we have been looking at the genre of gospel and learning how to harmonise. We also sang sea shanties which helped develop our rhythm skills using cups for percussion. In Maths, we have focussed on place value, multiplication and division and fractions. The children have showed great resilience in the concept of fractions and have been challenged by equivalence and fraction calculations. In our writing lessons, we enjoyed learning about Aesop and wrote our own fables based on 'The Hare and The Tortoise'. We also wrote a persuasive leaflet about visiting Greece. The children tried hard to use a range of persuasive linguistic features such as: alliteration, rhetorical questions, groups of three, direct address of the reader and exaggerated language. Next half term, we will be learning about the Maya Civilisation in History and grid references in Geography as part our new CUSP curriculum. We will also be learning about forces in Science and textiles/collage in Art, among many other things. We would also like to say thank you for your very generous Christmas gifts and we hope you all have a wonderful Christmas and New Year.

YEAR 6
